The Société Internationale d'Oncologie Pédiatrique/International Society of Paediatric Oncology (SIOP) was formed on November 6, 1969, as a small group of specialists at the Institut Gustave-Roussy (IGR) in Villejuif, Paris, who's mission it was to advance the study and care of children with cancer, a basic mission that continues to this day.

These aims have expanded to embrace the advancement of basic research as well as clinical studies, the inclusion of nurses, other health professionals and parents, and the organization of teaching and outreach programs to better the lot of children in underdeveloped nations and societies.

By today, SIOP has transformed itself into a truly global, multifaceted organization and is the only global multidisciplinary society entirely devoted to paediatric and adolescent cancer. The society has over 1800 members worldwide including doctors, nurses, other health-care professionals, scientists and researchers. Our members are dedicated to increasing knowledge about all aspects of childhood cancer.

After many years of preparation, planning, collaboration and the tireless efforts of the **SIOP Global Advocacy Committee** under the leadership of Dr Gabriele Calaminus, we announce with great excitement that the**International Society of Paediatric Oncology** (SIOP) is now in official relations with the WHO as a non-state actor.

The application and **three-year work plan (2018 - 2020)** were approved during the recent **142nd session of the WHO Executive Board held in Geneva (Switzerland) from 22 - 27 January 2018** and this new mandate provides SIOP with unique opportunities, privileges and responsibilities.

SIOP will have a presence at WHO meetings and collaborate within the rich network of WHO partners.

As a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO), SIOP has committed to contribute substantially to WHO activities according to the agreed and accepted working plan by:

- Providing technical inputs on follow-up of regional/national workshops, local stakeholders workplans, and advocacy;
- Supporting programmes that address competencies for childhood cancer control by disseminating WHO guidance and using the robust SIOP network;
- Conducting advocacy activities to improve access to essential medicines and medical technologies, by performing a situational analysis, identifying barriers and supporting implementation of programmes in select countries;

SIOP is now a step further in placing the fight **against Childhood and Adolescent Cancer** on the Global Agenda and **making a difference** in the lives of children with cancer and their families worldwide.

The SIOP Global Advocacy Committee **thanks the SIOP community and all partners** for their continuous support during the application process. We look forward to using this opportunity to expand our work together to improve the global situation for children with cancer.

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WHO Global Childhood Cancer Initiative

Ensuring a Right to Cure: Global Initiative in Childhood Cancer

SIOP, the only global multidisciplinary society entirely devoted to paediatric and adolescent cancer, represented by Dr Eric Bouffet (SIOP President) at this high-level meeting provided its overwhelming support for the **World Health Organization's (WHO) announcement of its new global initiative to bridge gaps in care and cure, and advance outcomes for children with cancer from low-middle versus high-income countries.**



The announcement came at the **United Nations (UN) General Assembly's sidemeeting on childhood cancer on September 28, 2018** which was organized by the Missions of the Republic of Uzbekistan, the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, El Salvador, the Republic of Moldova, the Kingdom of Morocco, the Republic of Philippines and the Russian Federation.

The WHO Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer partners with national and

international stakeholders including SIOP and CCI (Childhood Cancer International) **to provide leadership and technical assistance to support governments in building and sustaining highquality childhood cancer programs.**

The target goal of the WHO Global Childhood Cancer Initiative is **to achieve at least 60% survival for all children with cancer by 2030**. This represents an approximate doubling of the current cure rate and will save an additional one million children's lives over the next decade.

The objectives are to:

- Increase political commitment and capacity of countries to deliver best practices in childhood cancer diagnosis and treatment;
- Support governments to develop high-quality cancer centers as well as develop standards and tools to guide the planning and implementation of interventions for early diagnosis, treatment and palliative and survivorship care inclusive of the needs of childhood cancers;
- Improve access to affordable essential child cancer medicines and technologies;
- Support governments to safeguard families of children with cancer from social isolation and financial ruin as a result of cancer care;
- Prioritize cancer as a child health priority and increase available funding at the national and global levels.

This initiative **is founded on the World Health Assembly's resolution on Cancer Prevention and Control** through an Integrated Approach (WHA70.12), which urges governments and WHO to accelerate action to achieve the targets specified in the **Global Action Plan and 2030 UN Agenda for Sustainable Development to reduce premature mortality from cancer.**

WHA70.12: Cancer prevention and control in the context of an integrated approach

Actions to increase childhood cancer survival today represent effective and tangible steps as part of the broader fight against non-communicable diseases and steps that will catalyze global efforts to transform childhood cancer outcomes worldwide and ultimately save many more lives of children, now and for years to come.

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
Education, Professional Development, and Research 51st Congress of the International Society of Paediatric Oncology Lyon, France, October 23 – 26, 2019



Our annual meeting promotes education about all aspects of Paediatric & Adolescent Oncology to all oncology professionals, parents and survivors of cancer.

Our congress represents a unique opportunity to stay up to date in this rapidly moving field and to bring the latest science to bedside.

With attendance of over 2000 multi-disciplinary health care professionals from over 100, the meeting encourages networking among our membership and delegates and to promote collaborative research, mentor young investigators and offer education opportunities globally.





Pediatric Blood and Cancer (PBC)

Pediatric Blood & Cancer (PBC), published monthly by Wiley-Blackwell, is the official journal of the International Society of Pediatric Oncology (SIOP) and ASPHO.



Peter E. Newburger, MD, of the University of Massachusetts Medical School, Worcester, MA, serves as editor. Editorial board members represent the international constituencies of both SIOP and ASPHO.

PBC publishes manuscripts describing basic and clinical investigations of blood disorders and malignant diseases of childhood, including diagnosis, treatment, epidemiology, etiology, biology, and molecular and clinical genetics of these diseases as they affect children, adolescents, and young adults.

In January 2014, *Pediatric Blood & Cancer* became online-only. The **online-only publication** reflects a larger trend, with scholarly journals everywhere moving rapidly toward electronic-only distribution.

A joint ASPHO and SIOP Publications Committee meets regularly to provide support, oversight, and guidance to the journal. Members of the committee include the presidents and officers of each society. This committee is chaired by Peter Newburger, MD.

Other societies affiliated with and contributing to the journal include The Histiocyte Society, the European Society for Paediatric Hematology and Immunology, and the International Society of Paediatric Surgical Oncology.

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Committeess & Working Groups

The Scientific Committee

The Scientific Committee are primarily responsible for the organisation of the annual SIOP congress. They plan the programme, evaluate the submitted abstracts, and liaise closely with the Local Organising Committee to ensure that the whole congress runs smoothly. <u>Find out more</u>

This group lead on the work that SIOP does in developing countries. They have a number of working groups and taskforces, including: adapted treatment regimens; nursing; palliative care; Supportive care and Essential Drugs among others. The SIOP YI Network is represents the interests of young investigators in the field of paediatric oncology. It provides a platform for young investigators to develop research and scientific skills, and facilitates an international research network with other young investigators in paediatric oncology. A YI is any SIOP member or associate member under the age of 40 years, from any clinical or academic background. 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Scholarships, Awards and Prizes

Lifetime Achievement Award

The Lifetime Achievement Award is bestowed upon any present or past member of the Society for his/her substantial contributions to paediatric oncology and who is retired from regular practice and academics.

Nursing Lifetime Achievement Award

The Nursing Lifetime Achievement Award is bestowed upon any present or past member of the Society for his/her substantial contributions to paediatric oncology nursing.

Schweisguth Prize Lecture

This prize is awarded to the author of the best scientific article by a trainee in the field of paedatric oncology. The prize is given in honour of Dr. O. Schweisguth, founding member and first President of SIOP.

St. Baldrick's Int. Robert J. Arceci Innovation Awards

This award reflects Dr. Robert J. Arceci's values, which include: thinking outside the box, risktaking, true innovation and collaboration on an international level.

SIOP Awards

The Scientific Committee selects the six highest scoring abstracts in the fields of basic and translational science, clinical trials and developing paediatric oncology programmes to be presented in the SIOP Awards Session during our Annual Meeting.

Fasanelli Prize (best Ewing Sarcoma abstract)

The Fasanelli Prize is awarded to the best paper on Ewings tumour, if abstract submissions of good enough standard allow. The abstracts selected for the Fasanelli Prize Session are determined by the SIOP Scientific Committee and presented during the Annual Meeting.

Nöllenburg Prize (odd Annual Meeting years only)

The Nöllenburg Prize is awarded to the best bone tumour abstract. The abstracts selected for the Nöllenburg Prize Session are determined by the SIOP Scientific Committee and presented during the Annual Meeting.

Scholarships

For each annual meeting, SIOP provides 20 PODC and 5 Nurse scholarships to people who have insufficient resources to participate and to travel to the meeting. Successful candidates will receive financial support towards their travel and accommodation costs up to EUR 1500 and free registration to the annual meeting.

Young Investigator Awards

These awards are designed to give Young Investigators, working in the field of paediatric oncology, the opportunity to present their original research at the SIOP Annual Meeting.

Poster Awards

The best poster in each medical/academic discipline, as stated on the abstract submission, is eligible for a poster prize.


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Uniting the Paediatric Oncology Community Membership

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Promoting Best Practice through Global Guidelines and Tools Global Mapping of Paediatric Oncology Services SIOP has now mapped Africa for paediatric oncology services!



We are proud to announce that the first stage of the SIOP Global Mapping of Paediatric Oncology Services projects has been launched in November 2018 during our annual meeting in Kyoto.

The main objective of this effort is to collect information via a survey on the current landscape of paediatric oncology services around the world, and the resources available in each individual country.

The SIOP Global Mapping project is an initiative from the SIOP Board of Directors, and implemented by regional and PODC heads and the SIOP PODC Education and Training Working Group. It is being

supported with a grant from My Child Matters – thank you, Sanofi Espoir Foundation.

We are collecting information via a survey on the current landscape of paediatric oncology services around the world, and the resources available in each individual country.

The SIOP Global Mapping survey is about to enter its second year, and second region. The first year, we collected data on Africa, and next we hope to do the same for Latin America in partnership with SLAOP.

We aim to describe accurately the disparity of resources available to treat children/adolescents with cancer to advocate for more resources at all levels. With regular updates, we can measure the impact of our collective efforts to improve access to optimal care for children and their families, develop collaborations between/among institutions or networks, initiate twinning initiatives, and share protocols.

Preliminary analysis of the data from Africa shows the following:

- We have data from all but 5 African countries
- Results vary widely across this large continent
- Over 400 people have completed the survey
- 25 African countries have no services for paediatric oncology

This project has the potential to benefit everyone, especially the children for whom we care.

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The Paediatric Oncology International Training and Education Network (POINTE)

One of the most significant barriers to adequately treating children with cancer in resourcelimited settings is a lack of health care workers in paediatric oncology. Many training programs and educational materials are available but that information is often difficult to find and not easily accessible. Recognizing this unmet need, the leadership of the International Society of Paediatric Oncology (SIOP)-Paediatric Oncology for Developing Countries (PODC) Education and Training Working Group (E/T WG) sought to investigate which training opportunities were available and make these more accessible to health care workers from resource-limited settings.

In October 2014, they launched the initial website with a database of paediatric oncology training programs. The site served as a link between health care workers and the opportunities. Through personal communication, web searches and other methods, they compiled an extensive list. The "Find an Expert" program was developed throughout the following year, in an effort to link providers in resource-limited settings with their counterparts in high-resourced countries for help with care management and additional educational opportunities.

Though obtaining thousands of page views and being visited from 125 countries on the initial website, the SIOP-PODC E/T WG felt that this project had greater potential to reach more people and have a more profound impact. The Paediatric Oncology International Training and Education Network (POINTE) was launched on October 18, 2016 as an extension of this project. POINTE will remain true to the original goals of the founders: not creating any new content, serving as a link to help make existing information more accessible to health care workers from resource-limited settings, and open access with no passwords or members-only restrictions. If just one health care worker benefits from this initiative, they have the potential to touch countless lives
